ARES Vision



- ▶ The Amateur Radio Emergency Service® (ARES®), a program of ARRL The National Association for Amateur Radio®, offers to the public and to its partners at all levels trained Amateur Radio Service licensees who are skilled in the use of a wide range of emergency and disaster communications techniques and who are committed to supporting our partners' missions in service to the public.

ARES Mission



- ▶ ARES is comprised of organized, trained, and identified amateur radio operators who augment and support vital communications on behalf of the public through partner agencies and organizations during emergencies and disasters. The Amateur Radio Emergency Service, through its volunteer radio communicators, strives to be an effective partner in emergency and disaster response, providing the citizenry and public service partners at all levels with radio communications expertise and capabilities of professional communicators.

ARES Skills



- ▶ Hams possess unique skills. They can also set up field stations and portable antennas and use non-conventional means of getting a message through when other systems are overloaded or have failed.
- ▶ These skill sets are created and improved by the local ARES group through formal and informal training.
- ▶ These skills are developed in conjunction with local agencies where the team can meet agency personnel with whom they can expect to operate during a true emergency.
- ▶ This effort strongly contributes to developing mutual trust and understanding among the key individuals managing any emergency operation and should be exercised at every opportunity.

ARES Skills



- ▶ ARES groups are actively engaged so that they have the ability to perform certain actions and meet their objectives and goals.
- ▶ A goal of the ARES program is to ensure that program participants continue to improve and develop additional capabilities for serving the public directly or in support of partners' needs.

ARES Skills cont.



- ▶ Net Control
- ▶ Net participation
- ▶ Traffic Handling (voice & digital)
- ▶ Follow a communication plan.
- ▶ Direct experience with disaster response. (CERT team, ARC, NWS, NH HSEM)
- ▶ Knowledge of resources available to support disaster response.
- ▶ VHF / UHF and HF radio skills.
- ▶ SET & Field Day participation.

ARES Qualifications



- ▶ Hold a valid amateur radio license issued by the FCC.
- ▶ Have a serious interest in providing volunteer radio communications support in an emergency.
- ▶ Have an interest in self-improvement and maintaining standards for excellent community service.
- ▶ Many partner agencies have structured training programs where all participants receive the same training.

- ARRL membership

- Intermediate training on the fundamentals of emergency communications.
- Minimum Technician class license
- ARRL membership
- Completion of ARRL Intermediate training module
- Complete FEMA IS-200 & IS 800

ARES Certification



▶ Level 3 Certification

- Intermediate training on the fundamentals of emergency communications.
- Minimum General class license
- ARRL membership
- Completion of ARRL Advanced training module
- Complete FEMA ICS-300 & 400
- Completion of AUXCOM is highly recommended
- Completion of SKYWARN training
