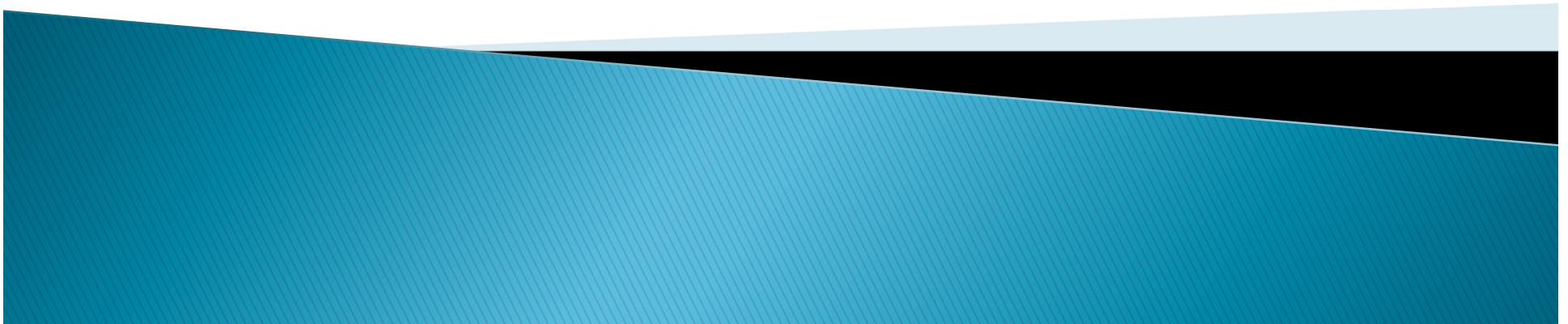

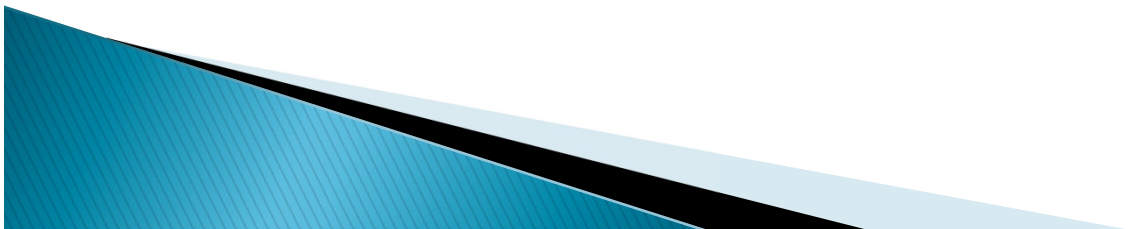

# HT Best Practices



## Core Operating Principles

The "Four Golden Rules" of radio communication ensure your message is received clearly and efficiently:

- ▶ **Clarity:** Speak slowly and clearly in a normal tone; do not shout, as this causes audio distortion.
- ▶ **Simplicity:** Use plain, straightforward language. Avoid jargon or abbreviations unless they are universally understood by your group.
- ▶ **Brevity:** Keep transmissions short and to the point (ideally under 30 seconds) to avoid "clogging" the frequency.
- ▶ **Three Part Communication** – Use the repeat back technique when given a verbal instruction to confirm the information was correctly sent and received.
- ▶ **Security:** Remember all conversations are public. Never transmit sensitive, personal, or confidential information over open ham frequencies even if requested to do so.

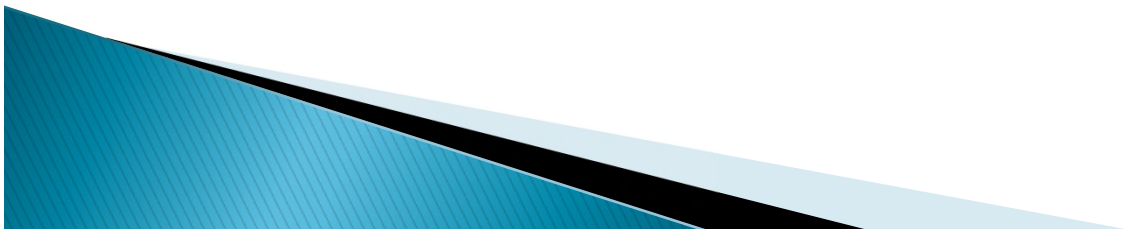


# HT Best Practices



## Proper Transmission Technique

- ▶ **Listen First:** Always monitor the frequency for a few seconds before transmitting to ensure you don't "talk over" an ongoing conversation. Be aware if your using a repeater of the timeout duration.
- ▶ **Microphone Placement:** Hold the radio or mic close to your mouth. Speak across the microphone rather than directly into it to reduce "popping" from consonants
- ▶ **The "One-Second" Pause:** After pressing the Push-to-Talk (PTT) button, wait one second before speaking. This prevents "clipping" the first part of your message.
- ▶ **Use the Appropriate Power Level:** Make sure you have selected to appropriate power level for the situation.
- ▶ **Identify Yourself:** Follow FCC regulations by stating your full call sign at the end of every conversation and at least every 10 minutes during a long exchange.



# HT Best Practices



## Optimizing Handheld Performance

- ▶ **Know to operate & configure your radio:** Create a cheat sheet for each radio,
- ▶ **Antenna Position:** Keep the radio vertical. The signal is polarized, and holding the radio sideways can significantly reduce your effective range. When using an external mic hold the HT over your head. With the HT on you belt clip and against your body it will absorb you signal
- ▶ **Battery Management:** Transmitting uses the most power. To conserve battery, use the lowest power setting (e.g., 1W instead of 5W) if you are close to the other station or a repeater.
- ▶ **Antenna Upgrades:** The "rubber duck" antenna included with most radios is convenient but inefficient. Consider these higher-performance options like a  $\frac{1}{4}$  wave antenna with a tiger tail to improve performance or connect to an external mobile or base station antenna
